When Charlotte-based interior designer Barrie Benson was tapped to create a capsule collection for the 50-year-old brand Highland House, her approach was simple: “The pieces I chose were all things I had a hard time getting my hands on,” she says. Her 10-piece offering is composed of upholstery and case goods she’s always wanted—and each piece, such as the “Dolly” chest and the “Peggy” chair, is also exactly the way Benson wants it. “It’s difficult for me to look at any piece of furniture without wanting to tweak it,” she says.
